Key Vocabulary—The Presidency

advise: to recommend or suggest; to offer your opinion to someone

bill: a proposed plan for a law that the government reviews

cabinet: a group of government leaders who advise the president

civilian: anyone who is not a member of the military or police

Commander in Chief: the U.S. president's role as the official leader of the military

enforce: to make people follow laws

federal: part of the central U.S. government, not state or local governments

military: the armed forces (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, and Coast Guard)

override: to change an official decision

represent: to make decisions for another person or group of people

representatives: elected members of a government group in the United States, such as in Congress

serve: to work for a certain period of time, usually in political office or in the military

sign: to write your name on a document to show that you approve

signature: a person's name written in their own handwriting

sworn in: when an individual publicly promises to be loyal to a country or an important job

tie: to have the same number of votes on each side

treaties: formal written agreements between two or more countries

wages: money earned for a job
